Farewell to a Champion: Remembering Ralph Petersen

LLM's pioneer Ralph Petersen was called to his heavenly rest on Tuesday, February 23.

In the early 1990's Ralph, together with fellow Trinity-Oregon City member Ray Hannemann, initiated LCMS outreach among our Hispanic/Latino neighbors by sponsoring a Spanish-language radio broadcast in Woodburn, Oregon. They recruited representatives of several congregations and began raising funds to sponsor the programs, later providing recording equipment. Working with local missionaries, Polo and Marta Garcia over nearly 20 years, Ralph saw the need for missionaries to help expand the work.

In the mid-1990s Ralph initiated and encouraged Youth Servant Events in Woodburn to work in migrant camps.

In 1998 Ralph facilitated a two-day workshop training lay people to teach



English as a Second Language as a way to initiate Christian outreach among our immigrant neighbors. As a result, ESL programs were started at Trinity and Ascension in Portland. Those ministries were the seeds of the Latino ministries in those congregations. He also organized a convocation to introduce Hispanic ministry to people in the North Willamette Valley and Portland/Vancouver areas. The event was attended by 98 people. The response encouraged Ralph to press LLM forward to develop the ministry.

About 1999, Ralph began working toward bringing on a team of missionaries. His vision inspired us to set goals of home Bible studies, followed by Spanish-language worship, and eventually training leaders to carry on the work of the church. He gave us our motto: "Christ for all – *Cristo para todos*". In 2002 God sent missionaries Miguel and Marta Luna to become members of Hope-Woodburn and in 2003 they were brought on as LLM's missionary team. Soon there were three congregations offering Spanish-language worship. Two of those congregations now have bilingual pastors. Ralph's vision has been further fulfilled in that, by God's help and guiding, we have accomplished colloquy for one pastor, Miguel Luna (now deceased) and provided seminary education for one deaconess, Marta Luna. Vicar Ruberto Ek Yah who came into the LCMS at Trinity-Portland will finish his pastoral studies in June, and Hana Laughton who grew up in the Latino ministries at Ascension-Portland, will begin her deaconess studies in the fall. Fifteen people are enrolled in Mission Training Center classes taught by Pr. Zabdi Lopez (Hope-Woodburn).

Over the past 30 years hundreds of people have heard the gospel and come to saving faith in Christ as a result of Ralph's initial efforts and constant support as a mentor, encourager, and financial donor. And of course, he kept the ministry covered in prayer.

Ralph is the one who got me involved in Latino ministries in about 1991. He was so proud and happy to see LLM's development along the way. Every time I told him of another positive step his face lit up with his broad and beaming smile as he said, "Terrific!" He will be greatly missed, but his legacy of charity, encouragement, and Christ for all, will continue. Well done, good and faithful servant.

and by God's grace, strength, and the Holy Spirit's working, I think LLM is a very strong arm of the LCMS. I praise the Lord for Pam Bridgehouse and I'm thankful she wants me to be a part of this really cool ministry.

So, enough about me. Let's get to work! More people need to know Jesus! Amen?"

"Today signaled the end of my active [chemotherapy] treatment. Thank you for everything!"


Here is Colleen's facebook post from that day:
